Phonics

Play a game on phonics play every day!

Practise reading and writing the sounds (diagraphs and trigraphs)

igh, ure

Practise reading and writing the words:

high, sigh, light, might, night, right, sight, tight, sure, lure, assure, insure, pure, cure, manure, mature.

Now try reading and writing the sentences:

The dogs might fight.

The moon is bright tonight.

Supper in winter is better.

I hear with my ear.

Stand at the rear.

This year you will get taller and taller.

Now try sorting the words into one & two syllable words.

light, fight, soil, cow, cork, boiler, taller, longer, boxer, mixer.

How many sentences can you write with the tricky words; he, she, me, be, we. Can you draw a picture of your sentences?

Maths

This week we are exploring doubling!

Try these challenges:

Draw 10 ladybirds - draw one spot on one side and one spot on the other, how many do you have altogether? Now try two spots on one side and two on the other ... keep going up to ten! Remember to count all of your spots and write the number down.

If a ladybird has 4 spots on one side and four spots on the other side, how many spots does she have altogether?

Draw seven caterpillars on a leaf, double the amount. How many caterpillars do you have altogether?

Literacy and topic work

Read the story Sharing a shell.

Have a go at creating your own rock pool. Can you draw a design and label it?

Phonics - Explore letter sounds featured in the story, e.g. 'sh' for 'share' and 'shell'.

Using pictures from the story and speech bubbles, add some speech to the pictures. Think about what the characters might be saying at different parts of the story.

Try writing a letter saying sorry to the crab or sea anemone and inviting them to share the new shell together.

Do bubble painting by using a drinking straw to blow air into thin, watery paint with a little liquid soap mixed in. Blow bubbles into the mixture and then place a piece of paper over the top to create bubble prints.

Use junk-model materials and construction toys to build your own model sea creatures, boats or submarines.

Write a message and put it in a bottle.

Reading

As always keep reading a variety of books at home. Talk about the pictures, characters, make up different endings! You could even have a go at writing your own story.
