Dear parents/ carers,

At Henham, we believe that promoting online safety plays a critical role in protecting our pupils online. I am writing to you as we believe it is important for us to work in partnership with you as a parent, to keep pupils safe online.

Our online safety measures enable us to provide an environment for all our pupils to thrive, grow and learn, whilst staying safe online. We put these measures in place through policies and security provisions which safeguard pupils against unsuitable content and contact, and ensure they maintain appropriate conduct.

As a parent / carer, it is very important you continue to have regular conversations with children about what they are doing online and what social networks, Apps and games they are using. You should listen to any worries or anxieties your children may have and let them know they can always come to you if they are concerned about anything.

As a result of the Covid-19 lockdown restrictions, our pupils are very likely to be spending more time online. Due to increased access to numerous different technology platforms, we are concerned that many children and young people are at a greater risk of online grooming, cyber bullying, and exposure to inappropriate or illegal content online. As such we have taken part in a training session with two experts in this field called 'The Two Johns' (eSafety Training). This training explored online risks, with a specific focus on those presented by COVID-19 and the latest period of lockdown and reduced school attendance.

We are now planning to speak to pupils about the potential risks online and how to keep themselves safe when using technology. We will be using age appropriate lesson videos and learning resources to support these discussions, and want to make you aware that the content may be thought-provoking and could prompt your child to want further discussion at home. It is important for children to have a safe environment in which to explore issues and we want to work in partnership with home to support these conversations. We have provided some useful websites below for you to access for further information.
